116th State Convention in Review

Our 116th State Convention began on Thursday morning at the Koury Convention Center in Greensboro, North Carolina. It was officially called to order by Roger Southern of President of Guilford County District 30. This was followed by the opening prayer and our Memorial Service lead by Chaplain Jesse Ray Farmer, Jr. The Memorial Service commemorated the passing of members of our rural carrier family for the past two years. Two plaques were made, one with the names of 2019-2020 Association Members and Auxiliary Members and the other 2020-2021 Association Members and Auxiliary Members.

NRLCA National Executive Committeeman Dennis Conley, spoke to us via Zoom on multiple topics. First on the Rural Route Evaluated Compensation System (RRECS) and the progress made on the testing and validation of the first 1,000 routes to test the system. To be followed up with five thousand more routes to be tested. He stated that carriers need to have their 4003 & the Route Edit book up to date and they must match. He also spoke on the special count. He added that we could see a mail count under the new system sometime in the spring. He talked about Plan B, second trips, and LLV deployment (that is totally on Postal Service) and possibly purchasing Oshkosh RHDs from Canada. He spoke about the contract negotiations. We have 35-37 pending proposals. A few of these proposals are benefits for RCAs, plus step increases for RCA leave replacements, New Hires, formula offices and granting more PTF positions and COLA. They are also working on compensation for carriers who worked during the Pandemic from start to end of year.

He spoke on the current legislative issues such as



H.R 4268, H.R. 3287/S.1663, H.R. 3076/S.1720, H.R.3077, and H.R.695/S.145. It was also announced the next National convention will be in September 2022 in Orlando, FL.

North Carolina District Representatives Bethany Small, Jeff Essick, Kelly Kenny Futch, Eddie Moss and Gail Naillon visited us via zoom for a Q & A session.

Robbie "Porkchop" Gurganus announced last years \$500.00 gift cards winners were Eric Hunter and Kelly Kenny Futch. He spoke about our current standings with PAC. Then Dale Sain talked to us about the Provident Guild.

President Brenda Gibbs spoke about SAC in the absence of Derek Harpe. Brenda Gibbs gave us the information for the next SAC Conference and Derek Harpe would like our feedback on the current date for SAC or to push it into early Spring. Tracy Greer spoke on National General Insurance, and Elaine Althoff on Open Season and the price changes in the Rural Carrier Benefit Plan. The new RCA plan had not been released at the time. Also, in the afternoon the constitution committee presented eleven constitution changes. One was tabled until the next State Convention, two were amended for language clarification purposes. Once these changes were made, they were seconded. Eight were passed by the delegates with no change.

On Friday, Justin Henderson, Postmaster Charlotte NC, Crystal Robinson, Postmaster Greensboro, Ronnie White, Postmaster Greensboro, and Robert Hall POOM addressed our group and answered questions from our attendees.

Special Guest North Carolina Congresswoman Kathy Manning addressed our group followed by the Postmaster General Louis DeJoy.

We held our officer elections with Audrey Solomon elected as President, myself (Elaine Althoff) elected as Vice-President, Vicki Gray re-elected as Secretary/ Treasurer, Tracy Greer was elected to the three-year Executive Committee position. Jay Schreiber was elected to the two-year unexpired term of Executive Committeeman formally held by Scott Deal. NRLCA Executive Committeeman Jeanette P. Dwyer installed the State officers.

We closed with prayer lead by Chaplain Jesse Ray Farmer, Jr.

I would like to say "*Thank You*" to everyone who attended. All of the first-time attendees and the RCA's that joined us. *It was good to have you*. I hope to see each one at the next State Convention in Cherokee, NC and please bring a friend. I am hopeful that things will be better and you will be able to experience a fullblown convention. I was also glad to see Rutherford/ Polk/Henderson/Transylvania represented and I hope to see you again at the next State Convention. **Safety** Brian Hamlett



Winter Driving

It's here again. Winter. Snow and ice could be just around the corner and that makes our jobs that much more difficult and dangerous. There are some things that we can do to keep ourselves safe while serving our routes.

Inspect your route vehicle now. Check your tires for tread and proper inflation. This goes for postal owned vehicles as well. Our POVs that we use are expected to be maintained to Notice 76, the Expanded Vehicle Safety Check, just like Postal owned vehicles. Get chains, or some kind of traction aid, as they are usually difficult to find in stores when they start calling for snow. A snow scraper is a must. I keep a small shovel and cat litter for the times I inevitably feel myself spinning tires.

Traction aids for your shoes, like Yaktrax, can keep you safe when walking in winter weather. Be cautious of shoveled surfaces that may have frozen over. Always use handrails when going up and down stairs. Dress in layers, as several thinner layers can keep you warmer than one bulky thick layer. I also keep a couple of water bottles and some snacks in case I get stuck and end up needing a tow. You could be waiting while. A phone charger is not a bad idea either.

Safety is the number one concern for us, despite the pressure management may put on us to hurry up and get back. Try not to put yourself in a position that could result in injury or damage to you, your customers, or property. We all want to go home to our families as healthy as we were when reporting for duty. **Retirement** Jay Schreiber

EMA Rate to Increase to 87.5¢

On December 10, 2021, the Bureau of Labor Statistics released the November 2021 Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which established the Private Transportation Index at 249.640, an increase from the August 2021 Index of 241.773. Therefore, based on the November 2021 CPI-W release, the Equipment Maintenance Allowance (EMA) for rural carriers will increase $2.5 \notin$ to 87.5 % per mile.

This EMA rate will be effective January 1, 2022 (Pay Period 02-2022).

It's A New Year

Little movement is expected on these bills in the early part of the year. This is a suitable time to write letters, send emails and make calls in support of these bills. Let the forms on the State and National websites be your **EASY** button.

H.R. 4268: "The Federal Retirement Fairness Act of 2021

There are twenty-six cosponsors, none from NC. The Primary Sponsors are Derek Kilmer, a Washington State democrat and Tom Cole, an Oklahoma republican. These two representatives have introduced this bill into several sessions of Congress. Eventually, they are going to decide that this bill is never going anywhere and quit expending political capitol on it. I have written my member of congress; G K Butterfield, three times and he still has not signed on. If enough folks from the first district were to write him, he might decide he needed to sign on. The same is true for every district in our state and all states. Write, check congress.gov to see if your member has signed on, if not, write again, check congress.gov to see if your member has signed on, if not, write again, repeat. We have until the end of next year to get this passed. After the new congress is sworn in in 2023, everything resets to zero.

If there is anyone here that is not familiar with this bill; it will allow you to buy back your RCA time for retirement. Depending on your individual situation it could make a significant difference in your retirement. I receive emails and calls from time to time asking how much it will cost. **WE DO NOT KNOW**. That will not be determined until after it passes congress. Most bills passed by congress are written in such a manner that the details are worked out by a government agency.

There is a form letter available on both the national and state websites.

H.R. 3287/S. 1663: "The United States Postal Service Shipping Equity Act

There are 32 Cosponsors in the House and two in the Senate, none from North Carolina.

This bill authorizes the mailing of alcoholic beverages by certain entities in accordance with the delivery requirements otherwise applicable to a privately carried shipment. The authorization applies to a winery, brewery, or beverage distilled spirits plant, or other wholesaler, distributer, importer, or



retailer of alcoholic beverages that has registered with, obtained a permit from, or obtained approval of an application from the Department of the Treasury. Currently, alcoholic beverages may be shipped by UPS, FedEx, and private shippers. This prohibition is a carry-over from; yes, the prohibition era, a constitutional amendment that was repealed eightyeight years ago, just not at the Post Office.

The NRLCA, working in conjunction with numerous other associations, has created a new e-mail form that makes it easy for you to contact your members of Congress and ask them to support the USPS Shipping Equity Act.

Go to the Legislative page on the National website to access the fill-in-the-blank email form.

H.R. 3076/S. 1720: "The Postal Service Reform Act of 2021

There are ninety-eight cosponsors in the House and twenty-seven in the Senate. NC cosponsors are Virginia Foxx (R-5), Kathy Manning (D-6), Richard Hudson (R-8), G K Butterfield (D-1), David Rouzer (R-7) and Madison Cawthorn (R-11). Both NC Senators are original cosponsors.

The bill requires the Office of Personnel Management to establish the Postal Service Health Benefits Program for USPS employees and retirees and provides for coordinated enrollment of retirees under this program and Medicare. The bill repeals the requirement that the USPS annually prepay future retirement health benefits.

H.R. 3077: "The Postal Service Improvement Act

There are five cosponsors, none from NC

This bill requires mail-in ballots for federal elections to meet certain design and tracking requirements and revises authority to provide parental leave to postal employees.

H.R. 695/S. 145: "The USPS Fairness Act

There are 277 cosponsors in the House and ten in the Senate. NC cosponsor are Alma Adams (D-12), David Price (D-4), Deborah Ross (D-2), G K

Butterfield (D-1), and Kathy Manning (D-6). Neither NC Senators have signed on.

This bill repeals the requirement that the U.S. Postal Service annually prepay future retirement health benefits.

There is also a form letter available for both bills on the National Website on the Grassroots page.

Those are the bills that I wanted to talk about this issue. I hope that all of you will contact your member of Congress and your Senators about these bills.

Signing up for PAC Withholding from your paycheck

Active carriers may elect to use one of their three payroll allotments to donate every two weeks. You must sign up for withholding exclusively through PostalEASE.

Have readily available **your 8-digit Employee ID Number** (on your paycheck stub) and your **4-digit USPS PIN or password.** If you don't have your USPS PIN you will need to call PostalEASE at: 877-477-3273. Press #1 for PostalEASE. When prompted, enter your employee identification number. When prompted for your pin, pause, and then press #2. Your PIN will be mailed to your address on the next business day.

Steps for signing up Online:

- 1. Add your Employee I.D. number to the end of the 9-digit NRLCA-PAC Account (163055555) to create your PostalEASE account number.





What Did PMG DeJoy Say?

Happy New Year!

I also want to thank all of you for all you did this holiday season and throughout this past year. I know it was a very challenging and demanding year and the holiday packages were unbelievable. Thank you, thank you, thank you! I can not say it enough and I hope your office takes the time to acknowledge all your hard work.

Now I want to tell you about our State Convention. President Solomon and Vice President Althoff have both summarized our convention in this issue. I am going to elaborate on what Postmaster General (PMG) DeJoy said to us. I believe our members want to hear what was said. Please know, these are not direct quotes from the PMG. I am paraphrasing what he said from the notes taken during his address.

First off PMG DeJoy stated that he cares about this country and the USPS. He wants the USPS to remain viable into the future. He stated that prior to his appointment the USPS organization was terrible. We had large inefficiencies with postal management and within the infrastructure of the system.

Everyone had failed to plan. The USPS was on a death march.

The USPS failed to evolve fast enough. Our delivery points expand at a rate of 1 million per year. Marketing that could have been done was never done. Equipment we have was not being used and we have the worst transportation company in the USA. Trucks were driving across the country only 1/3 full.

DeJoy indicated that we must have a vision. With a vision you create a strategy, then you execute that strategy. That is what his *"10 Year Plan"* is.

Under this plan he states that:

#1. 6-day delivery will remain in place.

#2. We have to commit to be self-sustaining.

#3. And most important, we have to believe in the future, that we will still be here.

To do all this we need to find \$10 billion a year.

DeJoy stated that we are here to serve the American people. We need to get our costs right. Regular mail is down and we can no longer count on that revenue. Parcels will continue to increase and we must price them appropriately.

Amazon and the USPS are the only two companies that have the capacity to deliver to every home in the country.

> The USPS is the most trusted government company. We need to be not only the most trusted, but the most used. He said if you are the most used then you are the most needed. We want to be the preferred delivery product. I am committed to a good retail product. We must design the most efficient network to deliver those parcels and price that accordingly.

> DeJoy did address the "slow down" of mail begun on October 1st. He assured us that most mail will still be delivered in the historic 2 to 3 day window. Local mail has not changed, even regional mail standards have not changed. What has changed is the transportation of the mail from one side of the country to the other. DeJoy's new standards reset the delivery expectations from three days to five days on long distance mail.

He expressed that we were not meeting

that 3 day standard anyway. Why not just be honest with the American people rather than failing to meet their expectations? Besides that, it is not cost effective to send half empty trucks across the country or pay additional fees to other couriers to ship our mail on airplanes.

DeJoy asserted that the prefunding mandate from Congress is unfair and needs to be eliminated.

He also said that the USPS Board of Governors needs to have more of the vacant seats filled.

In conclusion, DeJoy says he wants the USPS to still be here and be viable 10 years from now. He is okay with our current wages and benefits. He wants employees to have a promising career and to be proud to work for the USPS again.

In other news from the Convention, I have included a copy of our financial statement that was presented there on pages 21-23.

We had twelve Constitution changes presented to the body. Eleven of them passed. Most were to clear up or standardize language. One was to increase National Delegate compensation from a minimum of \$1500 to \$2000. One was to formally add the Armed Forces Veterans Club into our constitution. A proposal to eliminate the Fall Booster failed.

Be Safe Be Ready

The bad news is that 2021 was the worst peak season on record in terms of volume and general environment. The good news is, that you survived it!

As we expected, the Postal Service was not prepared, in spite of the many public claims to handle the volume without egregious contractual violations, and many of our carriers were physically and mentally pushed to their limits. As a customer of the USPS, I want to extend my personal thanks to each and every carrier in the state of North Carolina. As the District Representative of North Carolina, I am in awe of the commitment that our carriers have to our customers and all the blood, sweat and tears that went into pulling off the busiest Holiday season of record.

In the past, Christmas Overtime was something

that we heard about, but never actually saw, the proverbial unicorn of sorts, if you will. I recall comments from regulars in my office when I was an RCA asking why it was even in the contract if no one ever got it. While I recognize that there are still offices where management

can still limit it, the ability to prevent Christmas Overtime altogether from a district standpoint wasn't possible.

The issue has been that management has failed to adequately staff the rural offices. In 2021 in comparison to 2020, the total number of CCAs and PSEs increased but the total number RCAs did not. Hopefully, the Postal Service will build on the mistakes made this year to set us up for a better peak season in 2022.

Now that we are in the New Year, this is the time of year where many areas of North Carolina experience their worst weather. The cold temperatures mean icy roads, snow and sometimes sleet and freezing rain. Now is a good opportunity to address any issues you have with your POV. Make sure that you check your tires for pressure and adequate tread.

If you don't already have an emergency kit for your vehicle, considering getting one that contains items such as a first-aid kit, flashlights, hazard

triangles, jumper cables, traction strips, zip ties and duct tape.

One of the most useful tools in my kit is a mini compressor to fill up my tires and tire plugs to repair nail holes. My kit helped me get my vehicle back in service many times while on the route so that I was safe, and I didn't have to burn through leave because I couldn't finish. You should tailor your kit to the area that you live in and make sure you are equipped to deal with circumstances that are specific to your region.

Make sure to check fluids, including windshield washer fluid as the salt and sand used to treat roads can build up and can impair your vision.

Please remember that when you have a flat on a Rural Route, you DO NOT exclude that time on your 4240. Per the Andrea Wilson Letter dated 5.18.1987, 'excluding lunch breaks (up to 30 minutes), all time spent on the job must be reported as actual hours worked on your trip report and time card.'

When you use your POV for delivering your route, what exactly is expected? The PO-603 outlines the Carriers' responsibilities in Section 14. When you carry a POV route, you are responsible for furnishing the vehicle for the safe and prompt handling of the routes' mail. Your vehicle must be large enough to

accommodate the normal mail volume and constructed to protect the mail from loss or damage.

You are responsible for maintaining a professional appearance and commercial advertising or political signage must not be displayed on the vehicle while serving the route.

Pick-up trucks are acceptable, provided all mail is protected from the elements, either within the cab, or in the bed provided it is covered and can be secured. For every day that your POV is used to deliver the mail, you should receive EMA (Equipment Maintenance Allowance).

If your route is an LLV/Metris route, then the Postal Service is responsible for providing a vehicle. You are responsible for filling up the vehicle and bringing any deficiencies to the attention of management.

If a USPS-owned/leased vehicle is assigned to the route, you may be requested, **but not required** to furnish a vehicle during emergency situations. For every day that you work a route that has a government vehicle, EMA is not paid to the Carrier.

LLVs and Metris's do not have to have an Amber Light in the state of North Carolina as they are Federal Government vehicles. However, NC Law 20-134 requires 'that a motor vehicle operated on a highway by a rural carrier (POV) or by a newspaper delivery *(Continued on page 28)*

person shall be equipped and operated with flashing amber lights at any time the vehicle is being used in the delivery of mail or newspapers, regardless of whether the vehicles is attended or unattended.' This is not optional. Every POV must be operated with a functioning amber colored light visible from a distance of 500 feet per the law. You may add white lights, but the white lights do not replace the amber lights, they serve only as an addition to increase visibility. When in service on the route, Rural Carriers have no special driving privileges on public streets and roads. Rural Carriers are subject to the same traffic laws and regulations as other motorists. If you wouldn't do it when you are off the clock, don't do it when you are on the clock!

Please be careful and remember to always prioritize the safety of you and those around you. There are eyes everywhere so always be on your best, most professional behavior. Always be able to answer for your decisions.

Procedure to File a Grievance

(See Example PS Form 8191 on next page)

You fill out the sections with red dots (# 1 - 4, except 3b & 3c). Management fills out the sections with the blue dots (#3b & 3c) when <u>you</u> actually file (discuss the issue) the grievance with them. (THIS DISCUSSION MUST BE WITHIN 14 DAYS FROM THE DATE IN 3a).


Once you have filed, let management make themselves a copy and you must get the original to the steward or representative immediately. The steward or representative **only has 10 days** from the date in 3b to setup a meeting with management.

Include a signed and dated statement telling your side of the issue. This statement is for the steward only. Management will not see your statement.

Never hesitate to call your steward or representative with questions if you need assistance. Never put your entire statement in #4 on the grievance form (PS Form 8191). Just state the issue in the form of a single question. Then, provide the steward with a statement explaining your side of the issue.

NOTE: Just filling out a grievance (PS Form 8191) and sending it to the steward or representative is NOT filing a grievance. You must discuss the issue with management at the time you are filing the grievance and follow the proper procedure.

Management must fill out sections 3b & 3c.
