Are you ready for Fall Weather & Open Season?

Happy Fall!

We all know what's coming besides peak season, Open Season. This year, **Open Season is November 10** – **December 8, 2025.**

Unlike last year, when everyone had to change, this year if you are enrolled in the PSHB plan and **do not** want to make any changes for 2026, you do not have to take any action to stay enrolled in your current plan and coverage. Please note, like past years, if you're enrolled in Self plus one and it is higher than the Family plan, you can make the change to Self and Family during Open Season. Make your supplemental insurance choices as well.

As I say every year, "If you do plan to make coverage changes, check that your current Physicians participate with your new insurance company as well."

Retirees, are you ready for open season? Make sure you take a few minutes now to reset your passwords and ensure you're ready to make any necessary changes during Open Season.

If you are retired and recently married, to change to a family health benefit enrollment, call OPM anytime from 31 days before your marriage to 60 days afterward. Otherwise, you will have to wait until open season to make the change.

Visit www. Post-Retirement-OPM.gov

The **MOU** to allow regular carriers to volunteer to work on Sundays and to volunteer to assist with other routes in the office. No carrier will be required to perform either of these duties. All work performed in accordance with this MOU shall be paid at the overtime rate.

This MOU is for the current term of our collective bargaining agreement and will not expire until May 20, 2027. You can find this MOU on www.nrlca.org

The **MOU** on leave Carryover- I always get a call on this one. You may carry over 520 hours of accumulated annual leave from leave year 2025 to leave year 2026, and from leave year 2026 to 2027.

EMA increased on October 4, 2025. The new Equipment Maintenance Allowance will increase to 97.5 Cents per mile or a minimum of \$39.00 per day, whichever is greater.

Now is the time to check your foundation. Is it solid? Is it built on the Rock?



Your retirement security rests on three pillars: your FERS pension, Social Security, and the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP).

But here's what many carriers don't realize – small mistakes in your personnel records can cost you thousands in retirement. Take time this winter to check your Form 50 and EOPF files. Those DACA codes might seem like alphabet soup, but they directly affect your annuity calculation.

If you're not contributing at least 5% to your TSP, you're literally giving away free money. USPS automatically puts in 1% even if you contribute nothing, but they'll match up to 5% of what you put in. That's like getting a guaranteed 100% return on your investment – better than any holiday sale!

Navigate LiteBlue Like a Pro

Log into liteblue.usps.gov and explore the "My HR" section. If you're within five years of retirement, you can get an estimate of your future annuity.

It's like peeking at your presents early, but this one's encouragement!

Protect Your Family with FEGLI

Life insurance might not be the most cheerful holiday topic, but FEGLI (Federal Employees' Group Life Insurance) is crucial protection for your loved ones. Your Basic Life coverage equals your salary (rounded up to the nearest \$1,000) plus \$2,000.

Remember, the last open season for life insurance was in 2016. When the USPS has an open season on life insurance enrollment, take advantage.

Make This Season Count

As you bundle up for those cold December routes, remember that planning your retirement doesn't have to wait until spring. A few minutes checking your benefits now could mean thousands more in your pocket later. After all, the best gift you can give your future self is financial security.

Open Season is Here!

If you are enrolled in a PSHB plan and do not want to change, no action is needed. You will stay enrolled in that plan.

The Postal Service Health Benefits System (PSHBS) will be Open Season November 10 to December 8, 2025

RCBP covers massage therapy when performed by a covered provider as defined in the Plan Brochure, Section 3.

The benefit is limited to 30 visits per person per calendar year and limited to one visit per day.

The in- and out-of-network benefit is the same:15% of the plan allowance for up to 30 visits per person per calendar year and no deductible is applied.

Reimbursement:

For reimbursement, you must submit a claim as outlined in Section 7, Filing a claim for covered services.

Your claim must include:

- provider's first and last name
- provider's address
- provider/therapist's license number or certification number
- itemized bill that includes description of services rendered
- cost for each service
- paid receipt

Fall Back, Stay Safe

On Sunday, November 2, we'll "fall back" for the end of Daylight Savings Time. That extra hour of sleep is nice, but shorter days mean more of our routes will be finished in darkness.

For us North Carolina rural carriers, this brings a mix of visibility challenges, wildlife activity, and colder temperatures to keep in mind.

Stay Lit

- Check headlights, taillights, brake lights, flashers, and turn signals daily. Properly working lights keep everyone safe.
- For deliveries after dark, a headlamp with a red light is especially helpful. The red-tinted light:
- Preserves your natural night vision
- Lets you read addresses clearly without the harsh glare of white light
- Illuminates your path when dismounting in areas with poor visibility
- A reflective vest, while optional, makes you more visible on narrow country roads and during dismounts.

Layer Up

 Dress in layers to stay warm and dry, but adjust as needed to avoid overheating during the more active parts of your routes.

Wear Proper Footwear

 Choose shoes or boots with good traction to prevent slips, trips, and falls, especially during dismounts on wet or icy surfaces.

Watch for Wildlife

- Deer and other animals are most active around dusk and dawn, coinciding with our time on the road and many delivery times.
- A single deer often signals others nearby.
- Slow down, scan the sides of the road, and anticipate sudden crossings from fields, creeks, and wooded areas.



The November 2nd time change is a reminder to slow down, adjust routines, and stay mindful. With extra lighting, awareness of wildlife, layered clothing, and proper footwear, we can all finish our routes safely.

Each delivery matters, but so does our safety. Let's all do our part to make it home to our loved ones.

Gift Yourself This Holiday Season

The following are before Congress right now.

H.R. 70 "Expressing the sense of the House that Congress should take all appropriate measures to ensure that the USPS remains an independent establishment of the Federal Government and is not subject to privatization." I reported 221 co-sponsors in my last article. Alma Adams, Deborah Ross, Donald Davis and Valerie Foushee are co-sponsors. We are up one to 222 co-sponsors with a Representative from CA signing on Sept. 30th. The Senate version, S. 147 had 7 and remained at 7 with Thom Tillis being one of those.

H.R. 1065 "Protect our Letter Carriers Act" had 135 co-sponsors previously. In August there were 4 (Continued on page 10)

Representatives and 6 in September bringing the new total to 145 co-sponsors. Deborah Ross, Valerie Foushee and Donald Davis are Representatives from NC, and they all signed on in the spring. The Senate version is **S.463** with 7 co-sponsors. There are now 9 co-sponsors after gaining 2 new co-sponsors from DE on September 10th.

H.R. 1522 "Federal Retirement Fairness Act" had 102 co-sponsors and is now up to 107 with 5 new co-sponsors in Sept. Donald Davis, Deborah Ross and Valerie Foushee are co-sponsors from our state, and they all signed on in the spring.

H.R. 3011 "USPS Shipping Equity Act" had 4 cosponsors and is now up to 5 with a Representative from FL signing on Sept. 18th. No one from our state has co-sponsored this legislation.


role models who shape the culture and success of their districts. No matter if a district has 50 or 500 members. Each meeting is another opportunity to invite, encourage and recognize participation.





Rural Carriers: Your Overtime is Coming....and So Are the Packages!

Ho-ho-hold onto your satchels, North Carolina carriers – it's that magical time of year when mail volume skyrockets, scanners beep like crazy, and coffee becomes your best friend. Yep, it's Christmas Overtime Season!!

The Christmas period kicks off the first Saturday in December and runs three weeks ending with the Friday before Christmas. During this time, overtime rules get a holiday twist:

Remember you

During the Christmas period, regular rural carriers are eligible for two types of overtime:

- 1. FLSA overtime FLSA overtime is paid at all times of the year for work hours that exceed 12 hours per day or 56 hours in one work week.
- 2. Christmas overtime Regular rural carriers are paid Christmas overtime under two circumstances:
 - A. Christmas Assistance assistance provided by the regular carrier on their relief day. These work hours are entered in the "Xmas Assist" box on the PS form1314.
 - B. Hours a regular carrier works in excess of the routes evaluation are paid at the overtime rate. This is based on the total actual work hours for the week, rather than each day. (NOTE: Paid leave taken is credited as work performed for the purpose of determining work hours)

The overtime rate for a regular (FLSA Code B)

carrier is 150% of the carrier's regular rate. The regular rate is calculated by dividing the total compensation received for hours actually worked since the beginning of the guarantee year (excluding overtime)

Remember if you have an "X" day balance prior to the beginning of the new guarantee period, the X day will not be available for use until the Christmas period ends. If a regular carrier works their relief day during this time and is entitled to a future "X" day, it must be taken during the same pay period. Rural timekeeping will not allow a DACA3 or R to be entered without a corresponding DACA X.

Regular carriers can provide assistance only on their relief day while a relief carrier carries the full route. For replacement carriers, it applies to any assistance provided on a regular or auxiliary route during the Christmas period.

RCA's and PTF's are entitled to FLSA overtime when they have worked in excess of 40 hours in one work week. RCA's serving any auxiliary

route are compensated at the hourly

wage for actual work hours and are not paid the evaluated hours during this period

Christmas overtime isn't just about the paycheck (though that part is nice). It's recognition of your superhero-level effort: braving the rain, snow, and the NC December chill to deliver everything from Grandma's cookies to the latest gadgets from Charlotte to the Outer Banks.

Here are a few tips for Surviving and Thriving

- 1. Track your hours: Make sure every extra mile and minute is counted...
- 2. Dress smart: Layer up you never know if a morning in Boone will be frosty or sunny.
- 3. Snack Wisely: Keep some local treats handy and drink plenty of fluids.
- 4. Laugh often: If a box of Christmas lights falls out of your satchel, it's probably trying to tell you to take a break.

So, whether you are delivering in Asheville, Fayetteville, or a small town that even Google Maps sometimes forgets, remember you are the magic (Continued on page 18)

During Christmas, management can pull from a different sleigh:

- 1. Volunteers (bless your holly-jolly heart)
- 2. Non-Volunteers (sorry, but Santa's list doesn't skip anyone)
- 3. RCA's and PTF's to help get the job done.

This is the busiest time of the year! You will be delivering smiles, gifts and occasionally mystery boxes that weigh more than a snowman. The Christmas overtime provisions are the stocking stuffers from the contract, a way to make sure your extra work earns extra pay. Remember Christmas overtime is not an entitlement, it is an option.

Your contractual rights do not change simply because management is controlling work hours. It is the position of the NRLCA that reporting times should not be changed on a daily or weekly basis. Rural carriers should receive reasonable advanced notice when the schedule is to be changed. If rural carriers feel pressured or forced to work in a manner that places them in an unsafe situation, they should request a PS Form 1767. Complete the form and return it to your supervisor. Discuss the issue and if it is not resolved, contact your steward.
